Diphthongs are complex vowel sounds that begin with one vowel sound and glide into another within the same syllable, such as /aɪ/ in "like" or /oʊ/ in "go." Triphthongs, though less common, involve a glide through three vowel sounds within a single syllable, such as /aʊə/ in "hour." Teaching these categories helps students understand vowel sounds' variability and complexity, crucial for reading and spelling proficiency.

Q. How many consonant sound in vowels?

In English phonology, vowels and consonants are distinct categories of sounds, and vowels do not contain consonant sounds. Vowels are produced with an open vocal tract and are the nucleus of syllables, while consonants are produced with some degree of closure or constriction in the vocal tract. Therefore, there are no consonant sounds within vowels. This distinction is important in teaching literacy skills as it helps students understand the basic structure of words and the different roles that vowels and consonants play in forming syllables and words.
